What is child abuse?

There are four major types neglect, physical abuse, sexual abuse and emotional abuse. Although any of the forms may be found separately, they often occur together.

Most of the states in the U.S. define child abuse and neglect as: Neglect — failure to provide

• Physical abuse — is injury (ranging from minor bruises to severe fractures or death) as a result of punching, beating, kicking, biting, shaking, throwing, stabbing, choking, hitting, burning or otherwise harming a child. Such injury is considered abuse regardless of whether the caretaker intended to hurt the child.

• Sexual abuse — includes fondling a child's genitals, penetration, incest, rape, sodomy, indecent exposure and commercial

exploitation through prostitution or the production of pornographic materials. • Emotional abuse: is any pat-

tern of behavior that impairs a child's emotional development or sense of self-worth. This may include constant criticism, threats or rejection, such as withholding love, support or guidance.

Each week 50,000 reports of Educational (failure to educate suspected child abuse or neglect are made. And the most shocking perhaps is that four out of five victims are abused by a parent (about 41% by their mothers).
