Norton City Ordinance

Published in The Norton Telegram on Friday, June 18, 2004. (1T)
ORDINANCE NO. 1531
AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTIONS 15-305, 15-306 AND 15-307 OF THE NORTON CITY CODE RELATING TO ELECTRICAL CURRENT RATES.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS:

Section 1: Section 15-305 of the Code of the City of Norton is hereby amended to read as follows:

15-305 Rates: Residential.

Rates per meter for residential electrical current for lighting and other domestic purposes furnished by the City shall be paid monthly by the consumer of such electrical current at the City Clerk's Office, as follows:

Beginning effective July 1, 2004, and to continue for a period of six months, the following rates shall apply:

For the first 80 kwh per month at 12.50¢ per kwh.

For the next 120 kwh per month at 7.50¢ per kwh.

Excess over 200 kwh per month at 7.00¢ per kwh provided that no flat rate shall be applied or allowed and further provided that the minimum monthly billing shall be \$4.00 per month per meter; further provided that the rate contained in this section shall be applicable to the user of electrical current for residential domestic purposes and allowable home occupations that are clearly incidental and secondary to the residential use.

Effective January 1, 2005, the rates shall be as follows:

For the first 80 kwh per month at 11.75¢ per kwh.

For the next 120 kwh per month at 6.75¢ per kwh.

Excess over 200 kwh per month at 6.25¢ per kwh provided that no flat rate shall be applied or allowed and further provided that the minimum monthly billing shall be \$4.00 per month per meter; further provided that the rate contained in this section shall be applicable to the user of electrical current for residential domestic purposes and allowable home occupations that are clearly incidental and secondary to the residential use.

Section 2: Section 15-306 of the Code of the City of Norton is hereby amended to read as follows:

15-306 Rates: Commercial.

Rates per meter for commercial, industrial and institutional electrical current services for purposes, including but not limited to commercial lighting and appliances, show window lighting and electric advertising signs,

commercial heating and cooking, as standard utility service voltages, single phase, three phase or both, furnished by the City shall be paid monthly by the consumer of such electrical current at the City Clerk's Office, as follows:

Beginning effective July 1, 2004, and to continue for a period of six months, the following rates shall apply:

For the first 100 kwh per month at 13.5¢ per kwh.

For the next 900 kwh month at 8.5¢ per kwh.

For the next 14,000 kwh per month at 7.00¢ per kwh.

For the next 25,000 kwh per month at 6.25¢ per kwh.

For excess over 40,000 kwh per month at 5.25¢ per kwh provided that no flat rate shall be applied or allowed and further provided that the minimum commercial electrical service billing rate shall be \$4.00 per month per meter and that if any customer shall have more than one meter employed, separate billings for each such meter kwh reading shall be calculated and made.

Effective January 1, 2005, the following rates shall apply:

For the first 100 kwh per month at 12.75¢ per kwh.

For the next 900 kwh month at 7.75¢ per kwh.

For the next 14,000 kwh per month at 6.25¢ per kwh.

For the next 25,000 kwh per month at 5.5¢ per kwh.

For excess over 40,000 kwh per month at 4.50¢ per kwh provided that no flat rate shall be applied or allowed and further provided that the minimum commercial electrical service billing rate shall be \$4.00 per month per meter and that if any customer shall have more than one meter employed, separate billings for each such meter kwh reading shall be calculated and made.

Section 3: Same: Space Heating.

Rates for electric current metered separately for space heating for an area to be heated has a floor space of 400 square feet or more and hot water heating, if wired with the space heating, shall be paid monthly by the consumer of such current as follows:

Beginning July 1, 2004, .81¢ per kwh, with a minimum monthly charge of \$8.00 per month payable in advance. Effective January 1, 2005, the monthly bill by the consumer shall be .06¢ per kwh with a minimum monthly charge of \$8.00 per month payable in advance.

Section 4: Section 15-305, 15-306 and 15-307 are hereby amended.

Section 5: This ordinance shall be effective upon publication in the official city newspaper.

It's wheat harvest time in Kansas, and the hectic pace makes it easy to forget about safety. Sound personal judgments or a lack of it, will play a major role in whether or not the 2004 harvest is a safe one.

Consider these tips for maintaining safety during harvest:

- Recognize hazards. Make sure that anyone operating the combine has been trained to use it and is aware of potential hazards. Review the operator's manual and warning decals ahead of harvest.
- Keep current with machinery maintenance. Make sure all safety shields and guards are in place. Keep up with routing lubrication, and check belts and chains regularly.

- Before approaching machinery for maintenance or inspection, make sure it's shut down with the engine off, the key removed and all moving parts have stopped.
- Keep bystanders away from equipment and never allow extra riders. One seat means one rider.
- Share the road. When it is necessary to move heavy, slow-moving equipment on public roads, try

to pick a time with light traffic flow to minimize contact. Follow traffic laws, and make sure all the safety lights work properly and safety reflectors are visible. Always use a slow moving vehicle emblem on vehicles that travel less than 25 miles per hour.

- Be physically and mentally prepared before operating the combine or truck. Fatigue, stress and worry can impair the ability to make rational decisions.

- Practice safe work habits all the time. Set a good example for others.

It takes time to prevent accidents, but it takes only seconds for a farm accident to happen. Farmers can do their part to make this year's harvest accident free.
