Test weight.

The dry weather has not allowed wheat to properly fill the seed. In addition, a delayed harvest due to wet weather may have also decreased test weight. Test weights have been all er-

ratic with lows in the high 40s to highs in the low 60s. Low test weight wheat does not

have the nutrients in the seed that higher test wheat has.

This means there are less building blocks for newly emerging

weight of 56 pounds is set for all certified seed.

Jim Shroyer, Kansas State University wheat specialist, agrees that a 56 pound test weight should be the minimum for seed wheat with farmers looking for seed with higher test weights if at all pos-

For this reason, producers need to wait a minimum of four weeks after they harvest their wheat before testing germination. If they do not wait, an incorrect germination percent is likely to be recorded. This dormancy can be overcome A minimum standard test by chilling wheat at 40 degrees F for five days prior to the test.
