(Continued from Page 1) which advises the governor and the Legislature on water issues.

Steve Irsik, chairmen of the Kansas Water Authority, said now was the time to take action.

'The statewide project plan is an all-out effort to make a difference," he said. "Today's Kansans owe it to future generations to take action now."

A report by a policy committee to the Kansas Water Office has said that water from the High Plains Aquifer is being withdrawn faster than it is being recharged.

The High Plains Aquifer is the main source of water for irrigation throughout the eight-state high plains region. Because the region receives little rain and snow, surface water is limited and ground water is used heavily.

The report, presented in October 2000, said there were extensive areas in Kansas where the usable life of the aquifer for large volume pumping, such as irrigation, is less than 25 years.


