# Vehicle renewal forms change

The state has changed the form and process for reminding drivers to renew their vehicle registration.

The old notice was a pre-printed form and accommodated up to three vehicles.

The new notices will be printed on regular paper and will accommodate up to five vehicles per page.

New technology has given the state Department of Revenue the

ability to perform a better match of the vehicle owner name and address information. The new notices will reduce postage and handling. They will also be printed in Kansas instead of out of state.

The new notices will be used for the Aug. 31 expirations. People with last names beginning with the letters "M", "N" or "O" should look for the new notices

# Water committee wants comments

(Continued from Page 1) which advises the governor and the Legislature on water issues.

Steve Irsik, chairman of the Kansas Water Authority, said now was the time to take action.

"The statewide project plan is an all-out effort to make a difference," he said. "Today's Kansans owe it to future generations to take action now."

A report by a policy committee to the Kansas Water Office has said that water from the High Plains Aquifer is being withdrawn faster than it is being recharged.

The High Plains Aquifer is the main source of water for irrigation throughout the eight-state high plains region. Because the region receives little rain and snow, surface water is limited and ground water is used heavily.

The report, presented in October 2000, said there were extensive areas in Kansas where the usable life of the aquifer for large volume pumping, such as irrigation, is less than 25 years.
