Luella Hollingshead Navis

May 19, 1922 - July 31, 2004

Luella Hollingshead Navis, 82, died July 31 at Meadowlark Hills in Manhattan.

Agnes Luella Bretton was born May 19, 1922, southwest of Speed, the youngest of 15 children born to John W. and Edith Harriet (Preston) Bretton.

She attended Rockwell School south of Speed and later in Speed. She attended high school in Phillipsburg.

On March 22, 1941, she married Roy Hollingshead. They lived in Stamford, Neb., Colorado Springs, Long Island, and Fort Wayne, Ind., before returning to Phillipsburg.

Over the years, the couple owned and operated restaurants and donut shops throughout Kansas. In 1975, they moved back to Phillipsburg where they lived the remainder of their married life.

She was a hard worker and her careers included working at grocery stores, retail shops and newspaper offices.

She was a member of the Presbyterian Church where she taught Sunday School. She was a member of the Rebekahs, the Veterans of Foreign Wars Auxiliary, American Legion Auxiliary and Business and Professional Women's Club, where she was recognized as BPW Woman of the Year. She was also a charter member of Angels and Inspiration Red Hat Society.

Mr. Hollingshead died in 1988. She married Lester Navis in 1990. They lived in Phillipsburg until poor health caused her to move to Meadowlark Hills in Manhattan to be near her oldest daughter. Mr. Hollingshead died in 2002.

She was preceded in death by her parents, all her brothers and

sisters, her husbands, an infant son, and a son-in-law, Raymond Schick.

Survivors include daughters, Letha and Stanley Glaum, Manhattan; Edith Schick, Densmore; and Merena and David Rogers, Nixa, Mo.; two sisters-in-law, Ethel Bretton, Phillipsburg; and Ayrus Nusbaum, Fairfield, Calif.; eight grandchildren; 11 great-grandchildren; and a great-great-granddaughter.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at Olliff-Boeve Memorial Chapel in Phillipsburg with the Rev. Mark R. Simonds and the Rev. Jerry Kaiser officiating.

Kelly Wolters accompanied Fred Henrichs as he sang "In The Garden" and "The Old Rugged Cross" and the congregational song, "Beautiful River".

Strip-till fall field day set for Aug. 19

Finally! It is nice to see most of the row crops in fair to good condition in the first part of August.

Sure there are a few fields here and there where the leaves on the corn and sorghum have started to fire, but generally, things are much improved over the last couple of years.

If by chance, the area could receive a few more inches, we could potentially have a very good harvest.

The improved conditions have also allowed the work that has been put in on a strip-till field day to start showing the fruits of the labor. With the many questions surrounding strip-till, a field day has been planned in order to answer the questions producers have

about this tillage system.

The field day will be on Thursday, Aug. 19, from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. one half mile east of Quinter on old U.S. 40.

This is a great opportunity for producers to view strip-till machines from six equipment manufacturers running through wheat stubble ground with the pros and cons of strip-till presented by K-State faculty. The strip-till system

should not be thought of as a replacement for no-till. Instead, producers who are using conventional-tillage to plant their row crops or for those producers who have soil compaction problems after grazing their cattle on stalks, strip-till may be a good option for them. Strip-till provides some of the benefits associated with no-till, while allowing more residue to accumulate on the surface compared to conventional-till.

Producers will be able to view various strip-till treatments in dry-land corn, grain sorghum, and sunflower with a comparison to no-till. In addition, there will be a skip row corn comparison to non-skip row corn. The plot has received more than 12 inches of rain from May through July, so the crops are looking good.

A meal will be provided at noon for free. To guarantee a meal, please call 785-462-6281 by Tuesday, Aug. 17, as we only have 200 available. In the case of a rain postponement, the field day will be held on Monday, Aug. 23.
