Football star to be inducted into Hall of Fame By DICK BOYD

Dustin McEwen, who was an outstanding all-around athlete for Norton Community High School and star football player for Fort Hays State University, will be enshrined into the Tiger Sports Hall of Fame on Saturday, Sept. 18.

In addition to McEwen, the 2004 class includes Petrece Faulkner, Lowell Smith and Fred Andregg.

The four will be inducted at a morning reception in the Memorial Union on the college campus. The inductees will also be honored at half-time of the Fort Hays-Chadron State College football game that begins at 2 p.m.

They will also be recognized at the Fort Hays-Regis University volleyball contest at 7 p.m.

Those wishing to attend the reception may purchase tickets at the college athletic office. They are \$10 and need to be purchased prior to 4:30 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 13.

Mr. McEwen, 1995 graduate, made the Fort Hays record books for his outstanding passing between 1991 and 1994.


He passed for 5,718 yards and 42 touchdowns in three seasons as the starting Tiger quarterback. He is second on the passing list in career yards, touchdowns, attempts and completions to 1996 Hall of Fame inductee Robert Long.

McEwen led the Tigers to a 19-14-1 record in three seasons, including the schools first-ever National College Athletic Association II football playoff game in 1993.

He was a two-time All-Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference award winner. He also rushed for 18 touchdowns as a Tiger.

McEwen is second on the alltime list in total touchdowns to former quarterback Bob Johnson with a total of 60.

McEwen competed in football, basketball and track for Norton Community High School and played baseball for the Blue Jays in the summer. Although he was outstanding in all four sports, even competing in the state track meet, football was his specialty.



Norton was 27-5 in the three years the Blue Jays were quarterbacked by McEwen.

In addition to playing quarterback, he started some games as a freshman on defense and played linebacker and defensive end and defensive back during his fouryear career.

He was also the Norton punter, although he was only required to punt 12 times his senior season.

When he completed his senior season, McEwen had become Norton's all-time passing leader, moving past John Tacha.

While playing for the Blue Jays, he completed 158 of 316 passes for 2,648 yards, or an average of 16.75 yards per completion with a 50 percent completion rate.

He ran the ball 171 times for 750 yards, averaged 4.3 yards per carry and ran and passed for 37 touchdowns.

He totaled 3,569 all-purpose yards for a 10.4 yard average every time he touched the football.

McEwen led the Blue Jays to the state football championship finals his junior year.


