Frank Ray Bennett

Frank Ray Bennett, 87, Jennings, died last Tuesday at Decatur County Hospital in Oberlin.

Mr. Bennett was born Jan. 20, 1917, in Towner, Colo., the son of Will and Victoria (Burnett) Bennett.

He attended school in Paonia, Colo. He also attended Colorado State University and Fort Hays State College.

On Aug. 31, 1941, he and Claudine Wright were married.

He had lived in Denver, Niagara Falls, N.Y. and Russell before moving to Jennings, where he lived the last 52 years.

Mr. Bennett was an oil pumper and had been a member of Mountain Slope Lodge Masons and Order of the Eastern Star, the Jennings School Board, Decatur County Extension Board, Lions Club, Decatur County Fair Board and was a 4-H leader. His hobbies

included baseball and softball. He had been a scorekeeper for basketball games in Jennings.

He was preceded in death by his parents.

Survivors include his wife Claudine of the home; three sons, Frank and Karen Bennett, Oberlin; Bill and Lulza Bennett, Key Biscayne, Fla.; and Benny and Ellen Bennett, Denver; seven grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Monday at the Jennings United Methodist Church with the Rev. Glenn Krebs officiating. Burial was in the Jennings Cemetery.

Five will receive trust loan

The Trustees of the Thomas D. Morgan Trust have selected Norton Community High School graduates Sheila Harvey, Brian Luft, Sean Lauer, Amy Myers and Nick Green to receive interest-free loans for the 2004-'05 school year.

There are ten students, including this year's recipients, receiving loans from the Trust. The Thomas Morgan Trust has loaned over \$250,000 since the beginning of this interest-free program.

The program is designed to aid students seeking education in colleges, universities, vocational technical schools and most other institutions of higher learning, excluding areas related to medicine or law.

The interest-free loan program was arranged by Mr. Morgan during his lifetime and is paid for by a bequest from his estate. Under the program, any Norton Community High School graduate is eligible.

The trust agreement directs that an applicant must have participated in and successfully completed one extracurricular activity during high school and have had at least a 3.0 grade point average.

The loan may be used for tuition, books and supplies, room and board and other approved expenses.

Astronaut program starts soon

The Kansas Cosmosphere and Space Center is now taking reservations for the Aug. 20-21 session of its Adult Astronaut Training Program.

The two-day training experience includes educational briefings, a behind-the-scenes tour of the Hall of Space Museum and time in the Cosmosphere's state-of-the-art training simulators.

Graduates of this program become eligible to join the Cosmosphere for a behind-the-scenes look at the Johnson Space Center, Oct. 27-31 in Houston. This trip to the NASA facility shows the working side of the space program. In addition to on-site tours, participants will have the opportunity to meet with NASA engineers and scientists.

from cooking. I helped him with it that year, but I never really made the cake. He was a chemist and measured; I'm a slapdash "who measures salt?" cook.

We found this recipe the year he raised a bumper crop of zucchini

and we ran out of friends who would take them. The children say we made them drag wagonloads of squash all over the neighborhood trying to give them away.

Remember that it is unwise to leave your car doors unlocked during this season of the year lest the zucchini elves find their way to your block!

The folks at the bank waited all year for the day he brought in this treat, thus the name.

TIP: Shredded zucchini is best if left to sit in a colander for awhile before use so excess moisture drips away. We even pressed it down with a paper towel to absorb a bit more.

FIRST SECURITY'S FAVORITE

- 2 1/2 cups sifted flour**
- 1/4 cup cocoa**
- 1 tsp. baking soda**
- 1 tsp. salt**
- 1/2 cup real butter**
- 1 3/4 cups sugar**
- 1/2 cup cooking oil**
- 2 eggs**
- 1 tsp. vanilla**
- 1/2 cup buttermilk**
- 2 cups unpeeled, finely grated zucchini**
- 3/4 cup chopped walnuts or pecans**
- 1 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips**

Sift together flour, cocoa, soda and salt. In another bowl beat butter, sugar and oil, then eggs and vanilla. Mix well and start adding dry ingredients alternately with the buttermilk. Last, stir in zucchini.

Use a greased and floured 9-inch-by-13-inch glass pan. Pour in, smooth and sprinkle nuts and chips over top. Bake at 325 degrees for 45 minutes or until tester comes out clean. May vary with moisture in zucchini.

Great alone but really out of this world served warm with a scoop of vanilla ice cream. Freezes well.
