## Norcatur residents put a new face on an old name

A new sign above the door sporting two red cardinal birds marks the home of the new Cardinal Bar and Grill in Norcatur.

The name "Cardinal Cafe" has been associated with Norcatur since the hey-day of the Norcatur Cardinals High School football and basketball teams in the 1950s, 60s and early 70s. When the town's other cafe changed its name, partners, Joe Dawson and Tami and Brian Cook decided it was time for the cardinal to fly again in Norcatur.

The former Keith's Market was purchased and remodeled into a spacious family dining restaurant that opened Aug. 9. Mrs. Cook said, "We aim to provide a comfortable, atmosphere where the whole family can enjoy a meal. We serve all home cooking. I make almost everything from scratch."

Mrs. Cook is the head chef, Amy Junginger rotates as morning cook, Mr. Cook and Mr. Dawson help out in the evenings, with Mr. Cook in charge of making pizzas after 4 p.m. The Cook's daughter, Bri, helps wait tables after school as does another daughter, Brandy, when she is home from college. Ms. Junginger and Laurie Milnes are other waitresses.

The Cardinal Bar and Grill specializes in family dining featuring charbroiled burgers and steaks, breakfast all day long, senior citi-

Mrs. Cook said, "We are one of the few places that has gooseberry pies and rhubarb pies.'

The Cardinal Bar and Grill welcomes the coffee crowd and invites anyone wanting a place to host a special party, fund raiser, open from 6:30 a.m. to 10 p.m., club meeting or family dinner to Monday through Thursday; 6:30 give them a call. Mrs. Cook said, 'We want the Cardinal to be a service to the entire community."



The Norton County Ambulance Department will be buying new suction units to meet state standards.

Emergency Medical Technician Ruth Schillig said at Monday's Norton County Commissioner meeting they were getting ready for a state inspection and found that some of their portable suction units weren't working right.

She said a way to check that was to suck up pea soup. If the soup was sucked up, then the machines are working. Two of their machines wouldn't suck up the soup.

Mrs. Schillig said they found new units for \$305 apiece from Tri-anim, a supply company they have used before. She said the web-site price is \$375, but the company is giving them a price-break.
