

Huskies beat Eastern Heights 74-14

It wasn't a pretty sight Friday night for Mustang fans as Northern Valley took on Eastern Heights in Alma and more than quintupled the visitor's score, winning 74-14.

The Huskies managed to get a 46-0 lead by the end of the first quarter. Thomas Ostmeyer brought in the first touchdown when he made a 76-yard kick return seven seconds into the game. Jesse Hilburn ran in the conversion points.

With 9:39 showing, Hilburn was in the end zone on a 28-yard run for six more. Clarke Nelson added another 2 when he ran in the points after. Thirteen seconds later Nelson ran the ball 14 yards to score again. The pass for extra points fell short.

At 7:33, Joey Copper scrambled 19-yards into the end zone. Avery Thalheim passed to Ostmeyer for the extra points. Thalheim then dashed 2 to score again with Nelson running in the points after.

Ostmeyer ended the quarter scoring on a 68-yard punt return. Copper passed to Hilburn for the conversion for the extra two points.

Northern Valley brought out its B-team in the second quarter. Brynton Anderson was first to score on an 18-yard run with 6:21 on the clock. Anderson passed to Henry Griffiths for the points after.

With 4:42 showing, Eastern Heights made it on the board with a 50-yard touchdown pass from Bryan Shaffer to Josh Kirk. The run for extra points fell short, leaving the tally 54-6.

Two seconds later, Northern Valley's Bryce Marble scrambled 45 yards for a Husky touchdown and then ran in the conversion. With 11 seconds left in the half, Marble ran another 50 yards to score again. The pass for extra points fell short, leaving the half-time tally 68-6.

No one scored in the third quarter.

The Mustangs were first into the end zone early in the fourth on a 1-yard run made by Shaffer. Shaffer passed to Tim Vincent for the extra points, bringing the tally up to 68-14.

With 7:43 left, the Huskies made the last touchdown on a 44-yard scramble from Anderson. The run for extra points failed, making the final tally 74-14.

"We did a nice job on special teams," said Coach Chuck Fessenden. "Bryce Marble had a good night running the ball for our second team. We were able to play a lot of kids in the game."

Marble led rushing for the Huskies with 144 yards on 6 carries. He was followed by Anderson, 78 yards on 8 carries; Copper, 53 yards on 3 carries; Hilburn, 45 yards on 4 carries; Cody Lowry, 41 yards on 5 carries; Frans Laubscher, 33 yards on 4 carries; Nelson, 31 yards on 5 carries; and Thalheim, 4 yards on 2 carries.

Passes were made by Copper, 1 of 2 for 3 yards; Thalheim, 1 of 2 for 3 yards; and Anderson, 1 of 3 for 3 yards. Receiving were Ostmeyer, 1 for 3 yards; Hilburn, 1 for 3 yards; Griffiths, 1 for 3 yards.

Interceptions were made by Griffiths, 2 for 13 yards; and Copper, 2 for 2 yards.

Ostmeyer returned 3 punts for 129 yards and 1 kick-off for 76 yards. David Harris returned 1 kick-off for 11 yards. Copper made 6 kick-offs for 215 yards.

Making tackles were Richie Kersch, 6 solos, 1 assist; Lowry, 5 solos, 7 assists; Ostmeyer, 4 solos; Chase Miller, 4 solos; Griffiths, 3 solos; Chance Miller, 2 solos, 5 assists; Harris, 2 solos, 2 assists;

Coach Peggy Cox's Norton Community High School junior varsity girls volleyball team completed an outstanding 15-8 season with a victory over Golden Plains and a close loss to Logan on Oct. 12 in Logan.

"Lacey Roe was another server who lit it up from the service line with four aces. Many of our players had kills at the net and just played aggressively throughout the match."

Serving statistics were: Darling, 15-17, 7 aces; Courtney Cox, 12-12, 2 aces; Roe, 6-7, 4 aces.

Naomi Streck, Roe, Cox and Amber Waggoner passed at an extremely high level. Alexi Wolf and Cox had 7 and 5 assists, respectively. Maggie Nielsen had 4 kills, followed by Courtney LeClair, 3; Dana Hillebrand, 2; Wolf, Darling, Brianna Felton, Laura Delimont, 1 each.

Logan

Norton lost to Logan 27-29, 25-21, 23-25.

"This match was a hard fought one on both sides," said Coach Cox. "Playing on their home court gave Logan the definite advantage, especially in their smaller gym. Unfortunately, this match was probably one of our worst passing nights from some of our key players. Add that to the home court advantage and we came up a bit short."

Serving statistics were: Roe, 7-7, 1 ace; Darling, 15-19, 7 aces; Streck, 11-14, 4 aces; Cox, 13-14, 3 aces; Wolf, 15-16; LeClair, 5-6, 1 ace.

Hillebrand, Cox, LeClair and Roe passed consistently. Wolf and Cox had 9 and 5 assists, respectively. Streck led the way with 5 kills, followed by Wolf, Morgan Kauten, 2 each; Felton, Roe, Nielsen, LeClair, 1 each.

"Overall, this season was a great one," said Coach Cox. "Our girls went 15-8 and I saw many good things happen throughout the season."

"This is an outstanding group of young ladies who will do some great things if they keep their focus, train hard in the off season and stay aggressive."

THE ONLY ITEMS TO BE PUT IN THE ALLEY ARE METALS AND TREE LIMBS. NO OTHER ITEMS WILL BE PICKED UP IN THE ALLEY!

All types of trash will be picked up on your regular trash route day EXCEPT yard waste, tires, household hazardous waste and construction debris. There will be a \$10.00 charge per item for appliances (refrigerators, air conditioners, etc.) if the freon has not been removed.

YARD WASTE WILL BE PICKED UP ON YOUR YARD WASTE ROUTE DAY— IT MUST BE PLACED AT THE CURB AND BE IN A SOLID CONTAINER!

(Tree limbs must be cut no longer than 8 feet long or they WILL NOT be picked up) FIREPLACE ASH MUST BE IN PLASTIC BAGS

The maximum limit of items the City will pick up at each residence is 2 truck loads — one load of household items and one load of tree limbs

SPECIAL NOTE; Please separate the types of trash, i.e., tree limbs from metals, etc. because they are disposed of in different locations at the landfill. Mattresses and furniture need to be separate from other trash. Hazardous waste such as paint, motor oil, batteries, pesticides, poisons, caustic chemicals, etc. WILL NOT be picked up and should be taken by owners directly to the county incinerator site.

REMNINDER: Once-a-week pickup begins the week of November 8. Beginning that week, only regular household trash and recyclables will be picked up on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of each week.
