Pittsburg will play in championship

Pittsburg State University, the No. l nationally ranked football tream in NCAA Division II, will play No. 3 ranked Valdosta State University for the 2004 NCAA Division II National Championship on Saturday in Florence, Alabama.

The game will be televised live on ESPN. Kickoff is set for 3:06 p.m. at Braly Municipal Stadium on the campus of the University of North Alabama.

The 14-0 Gorillas are champions of the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association. They are led by 6'4", 254 pound Neal Philpot, senior quarterback from Norton. Philpot passed for three touchdowns last Saturday when Pittsburg State defeated No. 14 North Dakota 31-19 in the Division II semi-finals in Pittsburg. Entering the game, North Dakota's defense was giving up an average of only 10.8 points per game and 256 yards of offense. The Gorillas rushed for 304 yards and passed for 118 yards for 422 yards of total offense.

Pittsburg State bested the old scoring mark of 765 points set in 1886 by Harvard University and also surpassed the year-old total offense mark of 7,576 yards set by Texas Tech University in 2003.

Kia Kassman, 5-foot-11 inch junior, answered for Holyoke with a two-point basket but the Lady Dragons did not score again until Kassman tallied with 50 seconds left when Norton already had a 44-

Amber Engelbert, 5-foot-8 inch senior forward, followed Jones with a basket from beyond the arc at the 7:00 mark, then tallied again from long range with 6:13 remaining in the game. Jones buried another trey with 5:50 left to extend the Lady Jay lead to 38-30. Whitney Newell, 5-foot-6 inch junior guard, stole the ball and drove the length of the court to score with 2:45 left. Holyoke traveled against the Norton pressing defense and Jones scored in the lane with 1:55 showing on the scoreboard clock. Chelsea Cox, 6foot junior center, hit a jumper in the circle at the 1:25 mark and Norton led 44-30.

'We were a little ragged at times but got better as the game went on," said Coach Jilka. "We made some silly fouls in the first half but played a lot smarter in the second half. Our offense was better at times in the second half.

"I knew we would make some mistakes our first game.

"Switching to a full court manto-man defense and hitting our three-point shots helped.

"Holyoke has a good team. It 30 percent overall.
