# Winter car

Winter road conditions can make travel risky, but some hazards unnecessary breakdowns or damage to a vehicle — can be prevented.

If you have a battery with a fouryear rating approaching four years of age, have the battery tested. Consider replacing it early for worryfree starts.

Investing a few hours washing and waxing a vehicle before winter can deter rust and reduce damage from snow, ice and salt.

Salt used to melt ice on roadways is sprayed with liquid calcium chloride as it is spread. A corrosion inhibitor is added to the calcium chloride solution, but it is still advisable to wash a vehicle to remove residues as soon after a storm as possible. Spray off the underside of the car also.

Here are other pre-season maintenance tips to ensure a safe ride:

• Schedule a basic tune-up that includes checks on the battery, starter, spark plugs, belts, hoses, heater, defroster, antifreeze and exhaust system. A leaky exhaust system could result in carbon monoxide poisoning.

• Change the oil and filter. Traditional recommendations suggest a change every 3,000 to 5,000 miles. Some newer cars require less routine maintenance.

· Fill the windshield wiper fluid reservoir. Carry an extra bottle of washer fluid that will withstand temperatures down to 30 degrees below zero, and some paper towels in the trunk.

• Replace windshield wiper blades, and invest in a snow brush and ice scraper. Using windshield wipers to scrape ice can damage blades, wiper mechanisms and the windshield. Allow time to brush off snow, scrape ice and allow defrosters to do their job. Commercial deicers can be helpful, but using hot water on the windshield or windows to speed the process may crack the glass.

· Check tires for inflation, tread and wear patterns. All-weather tires work well for most people, but if frequent travel is a must, snow tires
