member the answer to the second question, you might need to read Matthew 28:16-20. Just like the Ten Commandments aren't the Ten Suggestions, the Great Commission isn't a job offer. Jesus didn't say, "Go when you get around to it." and he didn't say, "Go if you feel like it." Jesus said, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations. . . ."

God's gift of grace to us is so abundant; we are so blessed. When we read the paper or watch television, it's so obvious that, in comparison to most of the people in this world, even the poor among us have much.
