4-H archery to start soon

The 4-H Archery program plans to start again Sunday at the Norton Archery Range, in the building west of Pure Prairie Natural Foods. Enter through the back door.

First-time beginners to the program are asked to be there at 1 p.m. Advanced return participants may arrive at 3 p.m. The suggested age is 9-18 years of age and participants need not be in a 4-H club to take part in the program.

The weekly sessions include

five mandatory sessions that allow the participant to take part in competitions. After the beginning training sessions, there will be regular practices for some of the spring shoots.

There is a small fee for the class but archers do not necessarily need to have their own equipment.

Travel needed to get licenses

People in Norton County who want to purchase a commercial drivers license will have to travel a bit to do so.

As of Jan. 1, because of federal legislation, commercial drivers licenses (CDLs) can only be purchased at a state drivers license office.

Any drivers license that has CDL printed on the top right corner can't be processed at regular county offices, including name and address changes.

However, said County Treasurer Cindy Linner, they will still be able to do Class A and B non-commercial licenses, and Class C,

or regular drivers licenses, as well as identification cards.

She said the only places in the area where CDLs can be applied for or renewed are the treasurer's offices in Phillipsburg, Hays and Colby. Those offices are open for drivers license renewals from 7 a.m. to 5:45 p.m. Tuesday through Friday.

The Norton County Treasurer's Office is open for renewals 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tuesday through Friday.
