Consumers will know what they are buying

If you haven't already heard, new food labeling requirements took effect on Jan. 1. The new requirements are for food allergens and for trans fat.

Manufacturers are required to identify, in plain English, the presence of ingredients that contain protein derived from milk, eggs, fish, crustacean shellfish, tree nuts, peanuts, wheat, or soybeans in the list of ingredients or to say "contains" followed by the name of the source of the food allergen after or next to the list of ingredients.

This labeling will be especially helpful to children who must learn to recognize the presence of substances they must avoid. For example, if a product contains the milk-derived protein, casein, the product's label will have to use the term "milk" in addition to the term "casein" so that those with milk allergies can clearly understand the presence of the allergen they need to avoid.

Food labels must also display facts of trans fat on the Nutrition Facts panel. Sources of trans fat include partially hydrogenated oil and some animal-based foods. Scientific evidence shows that consumption of saturated fat, trans fat, and dietary cholesterol raises low-density lipoprotein (LDL or

"bad") cholesterol levels that increase the risk of coronary heart disease (CHD).

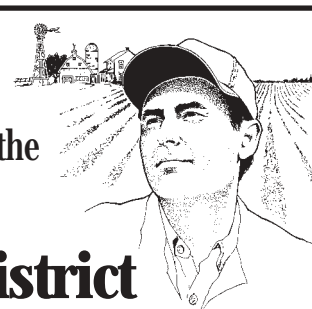
