Crop program deadline set

Deadlines for the United States Department of Agriculture, Farm Service Agency to accept applications under the Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program for this year have been established.

The closing date of March 15 applies to the following crops: in general your coarse grains including sorghum forage, vegetable and melon crops plus, amaranth, chestnuts, cotton, pecans, pumpkins, safflower, sesame, squash and walnuts.

Crops eligible for the noninsured crop disaster assistance program benefits, are limited to those not insurable in the county and are produced for food or fiber. In-. cluded are sorghum forage, floricultural, ornamental nursery, Christmas trees, turf grass sod, industrial crops, seed crops, aquaculture (including ornamental fish, and forage crops for livestock (mechanically harvest or grazed). Producers must visit their local Farm Service Agency to complete an application for coverage and pay the applicable

This is not a loan program, but an opportunity to purchase insurance on crops that are noninsurable elsewhere.

Reports and honors highlighted the Norton County Conservation District's 60th annual dinner/meeting Saturday at the Norton American Legion.

The annual report was given by board member Robert Clydesdale, who said the district received \$8,100 from the county and \$7,500 from the state for wages and district operations. He said the state also contributed \$2,659 to help pay for the administration and education of the nonpoint source pollution plan.

Mr. Clydesdale said Teresa Schulze, who won the Outstanding Conservation Educator's award last year, was nominated for State Teacher of the Year, which she won in November.

He said Norton County joined other districts in forming an area education alliance, which in turn formed the Kansas Natural Resource Foundation.

He said \$39,221 was channeled out of the district's cost sharing program for terraces, diversions, livestock wells, livestock pipelines, range seeding, and feedlot and field windbreaks. Also, he said, the (Continued on Page 5)

Police Department will be adding four-wheel drive

The Norton Police Department is purchasing a four-wheel drive vehicle.

Police Chief Lynn Menagh told the Norton City Council at last Wednesday's meeting that he sent out requests for bids to three different companies for a four-wheel drive vehicle and received two bids back.

He said Engel's Sales and Service turned in a bid for a 2004 Ford Explorer with approximately 24,500 miles for \$17,200. The second bid, he said, was from Jacob's Sales for a 2001 GMC 4x4 Jimmy with 61,000 miles for \$9,500.

The bid from Engel's met more of the specifications than that from Jacob's.

City Administrator Rob Lawson said the department had \$16,000 in its budget for a new vehicle and some of the capital outlay items can be juggled for the rest of it.

"We have the money for it," said Mr. Lawson. "I think we need a four-wheel drive in the police department."

Councilman Ron Briery asked if they purchased the Explorer, how much more it would cost to outfit it.

Chief Menagh said if they can transfer the lightbar from the old car to the new, then it should be less than \$1,000.

Councilwoman Elaine Mann wanted to know how old the police department's oldest car was. City Clerk Darla Ellis said the department had one 2001 and two 2003s.

The council approved the purchase. Mr. Jones abstained from the vote.

In other business, the council: Heard from Mayor David Corns that the Personnel Committee will be discussing the no smoking policy on city property. He saidhe also asked the city attorney to look into ordinances that prohibit smoking in public places.

· Learned from Mr. Lawson that Charles Krull with Blue Cross Blue Shield gave the city a certificate for being with the insurance company for 51 years.

• Heard from Mr. Lawson that the city's new digger truck and new electric distribution truck have both been delivered. He said he'll get bids from the two companies in Norton that make automotive decals to be put on the new trucks.

• Heard the city is doing a pilot test at the water plant in an attempt to remove organics from the water supply. He said so far the test has gone extremely well.

• Learned that Mr. Lawson will be meeting with the Kansas Department of Health and Environment on the wastewater treatment plant's timeline on Jan. 31 in Topeka.

• Heard that a letter will be sent out to the general public about the electric rates. He said Tony Turner with the Kansas Municipal Energy Association was supposed to do a rate study at the end of January and is now saying he won't be able to do it until late April or May. Mr. Lawson said he has been trying to get Mr. Turner here for two years. Because of the continued delays, he asked the council to rescind having the association do the rate study. They rescinded.

Mr. Lawson said he contacted Ranson Financial Consultants about doing the rate study. It will cost \$3,500, which is less that expected, he said. The study should be done within 60 days.

 Accepted the 2005 utility write-offs in the amount of \$3,867.94. The city attorney will continue to try and collect the unpaid amounts and will charge 20 percent of anything he collects.

Mr. Clydesdale said the district still remains a vendor for all types of grass, seed, trees and weed barriers for the public.

Board Treasurer Donna Hale gave the treasurer's report. She said at the end of the year the balance forward was \$2,598; with receipts of: county allotment, \$8,100; state allotment, \$10,159; miscellaneous, \$237; interest, \$130; and transfer from enterprise, \$8,500; for a total of \$27,126; and expenditures were: wages and withholding taxes, \$20,379; workers compensation and health insurance, \$3,745; dues and fees, \$200; grant expenditures, \$2,944; and miscellaneous, \$1,536; for a total of \$28,805; and a balance of \$921.

In the enterprise fund, the balance forward was \$3,409; with receipts of: sale of merchandise, including grass seed, trees, weed barrier and flags, \$67,492; annual meeting, \$3,059; miscellaneous, \$57,925; and custom drilling, \$7,385; for a total of \$135,861; and expenditures were: merchandise, \$66,382; annual meeting, \$2,726; miscellaneous, \$45,099; contract labor, \$7,790; dues and fees, \$1,185; and transfers, a fund balance of \$7,558 with savings at \$86,242 for a total balance of \$994,751.
