The future of state parks in Kansas has at least one Norton resident tossing and turning.

Doug Sebelius, a commissioner on the Kansas Wildlife & Parks Commission, said that Kansas, in 2005, celebrated a half-century of building a system of state parks to enhance the quality of life for every Kansan through outdoor recreation and wildlife conservation. However, he said, the future of that system is uncertain.

Sebelius explained that properly protecting and improving 24-state parks requires a dependable, longterm source of funding which is fair and beneficial to everyone.

"When Kansas dedicated its first state park 50 years ago, 70 percent of the cost for caring for the parks was borne by the state's General Fund," he said. "More recently, it has been 15 percent and soon there will likely be no general tax support for the park system."
