Here I am again viewing a beautiful Saturday morning upside down through the kitchen window above the sink. Am I practicing acrobatics? Have I been hung up by my toes to dry? No, it is shampoo day and I am lying flat on my back on our big old wooden ironing board with my waist-length hair in the kitchen sink.

Although there is perfectly good water in the kitchen tap, my first task this morning had been fetching two buckets of rainwater. Our wooden rain barrel sat beneath the southwest eave of the house and caught what little rain western Kansas got. Enticing though it was, I was forbidden to muddle around in it. The sediment had to settle to the bottom and remain there, so dipping water out was a ticklish job. Better be completely clear to suit Mama.

First Mama unbraided my locks and brushed them good and hard to dislodge dust. Since I often played in the hayloft of the barn, this could cause quite a cloud. Brushing felt really good and was the most bearable part of shampoo morning. Next, I held my breath and dipped my head in the biggest bucket and crawled, dripping, onto the ironing board. Mama grabbed a good handful of softsoap from the jar by the sink and massaged it all over my scalp to make a good lather. I grabbed a washcloth and held it over my eyes and nose. One thing you don't want in your eyes is grated lye soap softened in lemon water. During this stage Mama usually sang a few verses of "Silver Threads Among the Gold" to keep me

After ten minutes or so of lathering, dippersful of rainwater were poured on to rinse out all the suds. Now the real fun began as two cups of vinegar were worked into my wet hair clear down to the roots and out to the very ends to clear away soap scum. I clutched the washcloth tighter and tried not to breath. "Away Down Upon the Swanee River" was Mama's vocal selection during this application. Another dipper or two of rinse water, which, incidentally, was

The final bucket of rainwater was poured very slowly over my hair to rinse everything away before I was mercifully swaddled in a towel and allowed to sit up while Mama officer. Now could I go play? No, of course not. Detangling was on the agenda next. It could be a tough haul, depending on Mama's mood by then and that depended on whether I was patient or wiggly. This was the only time we ever used Mama's ivory comb with the wide teeth. It was carefully drawn through the hair until it hit a tangle. Then it was tugged until the tangle was out, despite my whining and begging. After that came brushing rebraiding I could only go sit on the porch and play dolls. After all, we don't want to get nice clean hair dusty before Sunday School, do we? Well, one of us sure did!

By the time I was in fifth grade I could sit on my hair. It was worn in thick, shiny braids that were the only reason I ever passed arithmetic. Each morning during braiding Mama drilled me through homemade addition, subtraction and multiplication flash cards. Finally, when I was the only angel in the Christmas pageant with braids, Dad reluctantly consented to having it bobbed. To the day he died he carried a little picture of me in his wallet that was taken one Saturday morning with my hair down.


