## Tobacco issue aired at council meeting

were just some of the things on the Norton City Council's mind at its last meeting.

Councilman Jerry Jones said they talked about the city's smoking policy at the last Personnel Committee meeting. At the moment, he said, the policy doesn't allow smoking in any city owned building or vehicle. However, he said, it says nothing about chewing tobacco.

Councilman Ron Briery asked if the policy could be amended to include all tobacco products.

Councilwoman Elaine Mann asked if that was necessary, since chewing tobacco didn't affect the health of other

Mr. Briery said, as an ex-tobacco user, chewing tobacco is just as addictive as smoking.

Besides just the health reasons, City Administrator Rob Lawson said people who chew sometimes spit on the floor.

"I've never seen it happen here," he

Tobacco, seat belts and vacation time asked what their objective was. Was it to don't require the use of a seat belt. protect the health of their employees or for

sanitary reasons. "What's next," she asked. "Sunflower seeds? People spit those out too."

Mr. Briery said if you ban one tobacco product, you should ban them all. The city wouldn't get into trouble with

discrimination if it just made city buildings and vehicles tobacco free rather than just smoke free, said Mr. Lawson.

City Attorney Chuck Worden said he would prepare a recommendation. Mr. Jones said the committee also

talked about seat-belt safety Mr. Lawson said there is nothing in the city code directly saying that seat belts

have to be worn. But, he said, it is the law. The council talked about passing a resolution saying seat belts were a must, but Mr. Worden said a resolution wasn't necessary. Rather, he said, something could be put in the personnel manual as a policy.
