Electric co-op has decent year

had another good year.

Board President Gilbert Berland said at the annual meeting last week that Prairie Land's line crews repaired storm damage last year and also built a lot of line for new customers. He said 2006 should be a very interesting year.

Carter said the board has rescinded the expenses - power costs, \$7,825,600; half cent rebate due, in part, to the cost of daily operations and also the cost of a blizzard in November and tornado last June that took out a substation.

distribution pole now costs \$594 to be installed, while a 40 foot pole is \$719. A mile of three-phase line costs an average of \$35,466.

He said last year's tornado and blizzard caused a combined \$6.6 million in damages. Prairie Land Electric had to pay \$750,000 of it.

Manager Alan Miller said Prairie investments, \$5,660,318; accounts and Land's employees were focused on service.

The big news, he said, is the Mid-Kan-

\$98,783; deferred debits, \$262,283; for sas Electric Cooperative, which Prairie Land is a part of, purchased Aquila's Kansas properties.

"Aquila is Latin for eagle," he said. "The eagle has landed."

He said approximately 68,500 electric meters will transfer to the Mid-Kansas cooperative when the transaction closes. The deal must be approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission and the Kansas Corporation Commission before it can be finalized. Those approvals are expected to be given around the first of June.

The six members of the Mid-Kansas cooperative have divided the Aquila electric system and will each lease and operate a portion of it, he said. Prairie Land will manage system maintenance, operations, and construction in parts of Norton, Phillips, Rooks, Smith, Osborne, Jewell, Mitchell, Republic, Cloud, Washington, and Clay counties, where Aquila customers now live. He said Prairie Land will also be responsible for customer service and billing to approximately 15,000 meters in the area.

Once the deal is completed, he said approximately 26 employees, who are stationed in Concordia, Smith Center and Phillipsburg, will transfer from Aquila to
