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## Legislation will benefit children

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Kansas Congressman Jerry Moran (R) and Dennis Moore (D) introduced bipartisan legislation that would allow the federal government to revoke the existing passport of any parent who falls \$5,000 behind in his or her child support payments.

"Clearly the consequences we have in place are not getting through to some parents," Congressman Moran said. "We owe it to children to strengthen child support enforcement. This legislation adds one more disincentive to fall behind in child support pay-
