#### Few turn out to vote Tuesday

#### **By VERONICA MONIER**

Voter turnout was, it seems, at an alltime low Tuesday, but it was still enough to elect the six people who ran for city office.

In the Norton City Council election, a grand total of 70 people, out of 2,080 registered, turned up at the polls. In the Lenora City Council election, 33 out of 219 showed up to vote.

In Norton Ward I, there was a 4 percent

turnout, while in Ward II the turnout was 5 percent and in Ward III, 3 percent. Seven percent of the registered voters put pencil to the ballot in Lenora.

All total, with the five advanced ballots, 108 out of 2,299 registered voters, or 5 percent, made their opinions known.

In Norton, Jerry Jones received 23 votes, plus one advanced ballot, for 24 votes out of 697 in Ward I; Donna Foley
