City council looks at what's happening at cemetery

The Norton City Council heard about what's happening at the Norton Cemetery at its last meeting.

Councilman Jerry Jones said the Parks Committee met with the Cemetery Improvement Committee recently.

He said City Administrator Rob Lawson and Parks Supervisor Steve Cole are planning on meeting with the cemetery committee to decide where trees need to be planted. Once that is done, they will mark the spots.

The Lions Club, he said, will be finishing the fence on the west side of the cemetery. They hope to have it done by May 13, he said.

The Parks Committee also talked to the Norton County Service Association, formerly the Amusement Association, about the fair. The city crews will be setting up the carnival rides for this year's fair, he said, so hopefully everything will go more smoothly.

Mr. Jones also said the Santa sleigh is still sitting outside and wondered if any-

thing could be done about it. He said it used to be stored inside a Norton Co-op building, but since Ag Valley bought the elevator, the space is now being used for other things.

He said if it continues to sit outside, it will probably rot and won't be any good for next year.

In other business, the council:

- Approved KQNK Radio as the city's official radio news media station.
- Heard from Mayor David Corns that the public library is launching an online library, where people can download audio books.
- Commended the city crews for the work they did during spring clean-up. Public Works Supervisor Dan Bainter thanked the line crew and the cemetery crew for helping with the project.
- Heard from Police Chief Lynn Menagh that a stop sign was going up by the railroad bridge on KQNK Road, next to Elmwood Park.
