Harvey J. Knoll, Sr., 80, brother of Anthony Knoll, Norton, died May 15 in Osborne.

Mr. Knoll was born Dec. 21, 1925, in Osborne County, the son of Wils and Celestes (Ulmer) Knoll. He lived in Osborne County most of his life.

During his high school years at Osborne, he loved to play football. Especially against Smith Center.

On June 8, 1945, he married Mary Lou McKinney.

He was a small business owner with Knoll Building Maintenance and a salesman for Southwest Petroleum Company for 38 years.

## Family plans 90th birthday celebration

Arnold Jackson, Norton, will celebrate his 90th birthday June 12.

Mr. Jackson was born June 12, 1916, in a sod house near Penokee. He was the second of 14 children born to Millard and Edith Dean (Hatcher) Jackson. He was raised in the Hill City/Lenora/Hoxie area.

When he was 17 he went to Joes, Colo., where he worked for his uncle, Sam Jackson.

The next summer, he and his brother, Lloyd enlisted in the Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camps in Atwood. They began work on an experimental cement dam on the Saline River, near Quinter, living in sod barracks. The Corps moved them to Ravenna, Neb., and they were able to live in wooden barracks.

Mr. Jackson and his brother left the Corps in April of 1936. In 1937, he went back to Joes and worked on the Tim Sullivan ranch southeast of Otis, Colo. There, he met Elma Fiechter, the ranch cook. They were married in January, 1939.

The Jacksons moved to Leadville, Colo., where he found work at the mines and helped construct Camp Hale, where World War II ski troops were trained. He also worked at ASR Smelters, Fortune Mine and the mill at California Gulch, Colo.

It was in Leadville that their first daughter, Carole Ann, was born in 1940.

In 1943, the family moved to Engelwood, Colo., and Mr. Jackson went to welding school. In 1945, he was inducted into the Navy and shipped to the

Phillipines, and stationed at Guiam Samar. The armistice was declared while he was still on board ship and he was discharged in 1946.

The family increased with the birth of their second daughter, Sharon Luana in 1947.

He returned to Englewood and helped build the Cherry Creek Dam. he bought a portable welder so he could go into business for himself. It came in useful when he bought the blacksmith shop in Norcatur and moved his family there in 1950.

The Jackson's son, Terry Lee was born in Norton in 1952.

Mr. Jackson ran the blacksmith shop for 32 years, retiring in 1982.

In 1998, Mr. and Mrs. Jackson moved to Norton to be closer to health care.

Mrs. Jackson died in 1999, shortly after their 60th wedding anniversary.

After his wife's death, Mr. Jackson moved to the Norton Manor.

Celebrating his birthday with him will be his son, Terry and Laura Jackson, Centennial, Colo.; his two daughters, Carole and Errol Slater, Wheat Ridge, Colo., and Sharon and Gale Schulze; his grandchildren, Jason Jackson and Jeremy Jackson, Centennial, Karensa and Anthony Francka, Makayla and Austin Baar, both of Norton and Amber and Duke Huffman, Ogallala, Neb.; and his great-grandchildren Annaliese and Daisi Huffman and Genesis and Noah Baar.

# Recipes always find this cook

Recipes come from interesting sources. During my recent wanderings I have come in contact with many new people. Somehow, with me, conversation always turns to cooking and food. This recipe is a hearty peasant soup from a surgeon with whom I became acquainted.

Borscht is commonly thought of as a Russian dish; however, borscht was made throughout central Europe.

During the long cold winters very little fresh food was available. Substantial soups were made from humble vegetables that were stored throughout the winter. Almost any root vegetable could be

added to stretch a thick, savory, filling soup. Because peasants grew most of their food in garden plots these porridges provided an inexpensive source of nutrition. Made without meat, borscht would keep indefinitely and could be served hot or cold.

MY MAMAS AID: Warm soup not only fills an empty belly but nourishes a fading soul.

### DR. J'S BORSCHT

Two large Irish potatoes well scrubbed, unpeeled and shredded  
 Eight big red beets boiled, peeled, and shredded  
 (Optional) One large parsnip peeled and shredded  
 Two turnips or kohlrabi peeled and shredded  
 One head of red cabbage, finely shredded  
 One big onion peeled and shredded  
 Four or five carrots scrubbed, unpeeled and shredded  
 Three cups liquid (water, beef broth, chicken broth or beer)  
 Three tablespoons pearl barley  
 Pour liquid into large soup pot, bring to boil. Add onion, barley and parsnip. Start simmering. Add potato, carrot, and turnips. Stir and simmer until vegetables float to the top. Stir in beets and cabbage. Turn heat down to a very low and simmer for at least an hour. Salt and pepper to taste, add garlic if you like it. Add more liquid if necessary. Ladle into bowls and top with a large blob of sour cream, sprinkled with fresh dill.  
 Serve with day old black rye bread. This effectively used stale bread, sour cream, no meat and vegetables available all winter. It may be an acquired taste for some, but many children of European heritage have fond memories of home at the first taste. It keeps for days and may be served reheated or chilled.
