



During the long cold winters very little fresh food was available. Substantial soups were made from humble vegetables that were stored throughout the winter. Almost any root vegetable could be nourishes a fading soul.

### DR. J'S BORSCHT

Two large Irish potatoes well scrubbed, unpeeled and shredded Eight big red beets boiled, peeled, and shredded

(Optional) One large parsnip peeled and shredded

Two turnips or kohlrabi peeled and shredded

One head of red cabbage, finely shredded

One big onion peeled and shredded

Four or five carrots scrubbed, unpeeled and shredded Three cups liquid (water, beef broth, chicken broth or beer)

Three tablespoons pearl barley

Pour liquid into large soup pot, bring to boil. Add onion, barley and parsnip. Start simmering. Add potato, carrot, and turnips. Stir and simmer until vegetables float to the top. Stir in beets and cabbage. Turn heat down to a very low and simmer for at least an hour. Salt and pepper to taste, add garlic if you like it. Add more liquid if necessary. Ladle into bowls and top with a large blob of sour cream, sprinkled with fresh dill.

Serve with day old black rye bread. This effectively used stale bread, sour cream, no meat and vegetables available all winter. It may be an acquired taste for some, but many children of European heritage have fond memories of home at the first taste. It keeps for days and may be served reheated or chilled.




