

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Norton County walkers go the distance

Multi-County Extension Specialist Can you meet the challenge of walking 423 miles or the equivalent of walking across Kansas?

Twenty-one walking teams consisting of 126 individuals participated in the 2006 Walk Kansas in Norton County. Seventeen of the 21 teams walked more than the 423 miles needed to do a virtual walk across Kansas. The team reporting the most miles walked was Walkabout captained by Bill Goscha. 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If the Oberlin City Council agrees, a bus company hoping to buy the old Jennings school will use the airport in Oberlin for moving employees, customers and parts.

Representatives of BCI, also known as Connoiseurs World Wide, and the president of Sardo Bus and Coach Upholstery met with Decatur County commissioners, Oberlin city officials, Jennings City Council members, county economic development personnel and others at The Gateway on Tuesday, trying to revive a plan for BCI to set up a bus-outfitting plant and a refurbishing facility for coaches, both bus and train.
