New machinists have all the right parts

To an engine enthusiast, Front Range Automotive Machining probably looks like a dream come true. Piece-after-piece of state of the art equipment line the walls of the new business at 102 N. Second, behind CarQuest.

Jim Linner is a 1975 graduate from Beaver City High School. Since then he has had several jobs including being an over-the-road truck driver. But, in 1994, he found his niche when he began working, part-time, in a machine shop in Longmont, Colo. He bought the shop a year later.

About ten years ago he met his wife, Heidi. She is an integral part of the business, handling the office and dealing with customers. Truth be known, she can "talk shop" right along with him, describing the various services the shop offers. She said, "Dirty work doesn't scare me."

Mr. Linner said, "Trust me. She knows more about engines than most guys."

He said, "We're not afraid to tackle anything. But, remember, we're machinists; not mechanics."

Front Range Automotive Machining can do anything automotive related. The list includes: valve jobs; engine rebuilds; crankshaft grinding; cylinder head work; resurfacing and pressure testing heads and blocks; turning brake drums and Neb., one daughter in Fort Collins,

rotors and fly wheels.

The shop will work on agricultural engines, antique engines, foreign or domestic engines and heavy duty engines. They will even do work on motorcycles and bicycles if it requires a machinist's touch. He said, "I can do anything from high-performance engines to marine to Model As."

Heidi said, "Jim has done some racing himself, so he knows engines." She added that he had done all the machine work for a Toyota dealership in Colorado.

For the mechanic who wants an engine block cleaned, Front Range offers a different method of cleaning. First, an engine goes through a thermal cleaning process, then it is lowered into a machine that blasts it with microscopic stainless steel beads. The process, which uses no chemicals, takes about an hour and the engine comes out looking brand-new.

Another piece of equipment is a boring and honing machine. It speeds up the process of doing a bore job on an engine block.

Mr. Linner said, "I've been around this business a long time. We're honest and we're fair. We do quality work at fair prices."

The couple admit they miss the mountains but agree they love living in Norton. They have one daughter who lives in Lincoln, Colo., and a son in Longmont.
