Norton City Ordinance relating to building garages on single lots

ORDINANCE NO. 1554

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 16-303 OF THE NORTON CITY CODE RELATING TO RESIDENCE DISTRICTS, AND ALLOWING FOR THE BUILDING OF PRIVATE GARAGES ON SINGLE LOTS WITHIN THE CITY OF NORTON, KANSAS

NOW. THEREFORE. BE ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF NORTON, CORPORATION. AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 16-303 of the City Code of Norton, Kansas, is hereby

amended to read as follows: 16-303. RESIDENCE DISTRICT. In the Residence District no building or premises shall be used and no building shall be hereafter erected or structurally altered, unless otherwise provided in this article, except for one or more of

the following uses: a. One and two family dwellings;

b. Private Garages, which will include the following uses and restrictions: The private garage may be erected for residential use only, on its own lot, but must have similar siding and roofline of the houses within a two-block radius. The sidewalls may not exceed 10 feet in height and the front yard, side yard, rear yard and lot coverage shall conform to the regulations of the district in which it is located, except as set forth herein. There shall be no outside storage of

equipment or materials.

c. Gardening and crops:

d. Churches and schools; e. Home Occupations, see section 16-

f. The following accessory uses:

1. A commercial billboard or advertising sign shall not be permitted as an accessory use in the Residence District, except a temporary sign not over 25 square feet in area, located on the premises of a building or structure under construction, advertising the

Published in The Norton Telegram on names of the contractors or the equipment and building material used in construction, shall be permitted until completion of the structure and dimension appertaining to the sale. lease or hire of a building or premise other institutions may display signs showing names, and the activities

provided therein. An accessory building (except garages) on an interior lot shall be located not less than 60 feet from the front lot line, and not less than three feet private garage is designed and constructed as part of the main building, or a detached garage that has similar siding and roof line as the house and whose sidewalls are 10 feet high or less, shall conform to the front yard and side yard regulations of the district in which it is located. No detached accessory buildings shall be erected closer than five (5) feet to any other building, this shall not be interpreted to prohibit the erection of a joint garage by owners of

adjoining lots. 3. An accessory building on a corner lot shall not be erected closer to the side street line than the main building on an adjacent reversed frontage lot, or the front yard line of adjacent interior lots facing on the side street not within three feet of any lot line which is the side line of a side yard on an adjoining lot, provided however, that nothing in this regulation shall be so interpreted as to reduce the biddable depth for an

accessory building to less than 18 feet. Section 2. That this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official city
