Lady Jays beat Northern Valley, but lose to Phillipsburg

The Norton Community High School girls volleyball team defeated Northern Valley but lost to Phillipsburg in matches played Tuesday in Phillipsburg.

After losing to the Lady Panthers 15-25, 24-26 in the opening match, the Lady Jays came back to outscore the Lady Huskies 25-13, 25-19.

"We had a good news, bad news situation in playing on Tuesday," said Norton head coach Chuck Zimmerman. "The good news was we played much better as a team against both our opponents. We served much better, a combined 93 percent, and hit better as we had 29 kills for the evening.

"The bad news was we lost to Phillipsburg in two games."

"What the score in the first game with Phillipsburg doesn't show is we jumped ahead early but did not hold the lead," said coach Zimmerman. "The Lady Panthers came back and won by continuing to attack whenever possible, which is the mark of a good team.

"In the second game, we hung tough throughout and played our best ball of the year. We attacked and had seven kills. Outr serves kept the Lady Panthers off balance enough that they were not able to mount as effective an attack, which was to our advantage. We were defeated but fought tough the entire second game."

Courtney LeClair, Courtney Cox, Maggie Nielsen, Brianna Felton, Hayli Bozarth were perfect in serving.

Norton missed just two serves, so averaged 95 percent,


