William N. Leydig

Nov. 1, 1929 - Oct. 24, 2006

William Norman Leydig, 76, Kirwin, brother of Darline Brown and Sam Leydig, both of Prairie View, died of a stroke Oct. 24 at the Wesley Medical Center in Wichita.

Mr. Leydig was born Nov. 1, 1929, in Glade, the son of William J. and Bernice (Mutum) Leydig. He was baptized as an infant at the Glade Methodist Church where he is still a member.

He and his brothers and sisters grew up on a farm near Glade, where they worked with their parents cultivating watermelons, cantaloupes, potatoes and other garden crops. He graduated from Phillipsburg High School with the class of 1947. He attended Fort Hays State University and taught in the Phillips County school for several years. He was also a member of the Kirwin Lions Club.

He purchased the Glade Grocery, which he owned and operated for many years. During some of this time, he also owned and managed Martha's Cafe in Phillipsburg. He served with the U.S. Army for two years and was stationed in Germany after basic training. After returning to the states, he continued to operate the grocery store in Glade. He sold the store and went to work for the U.S. Government helping to build missile silos across the northern United States. He then moved to Omaha, Neb., and worked building bridges for a construction company.

On Nov. 24, 1969, he married Queenie (Inman) Pickel of Holdrege, Neb. They lived in Omaha for seven years then moved back to Glade, where they owned and operated the Glade Greenhouse and Flea Market. Seven years ago they sold the business and moved to Kirwin.

His hobbies included gardening and helping others with lawn mowing and gardening.

He was preceded in death by his parents and two nieces, Janel Leydig and Linda (Leydig) Long.

Survivors include his wife, Queenie, of the home in Kirwin; two brothers, Jacob and Lois Leydig, St. Francis, and, Sam and Belva Leydig, Prairie View; two sisters, Darline and Walter Brown, Prairie View and Verlee and "Doc" Clark, Noel, Mo.; a stepdaughter, Cleora and Bruce McPhillamy, Holdrege; six step-grandchildren; 16 step-great-grandchildren; and two step-great-great-grandchildren.

Funeral services were held Friday at the Olliff-Boeve Memorial Chapel in Phillipsburg with the Rev. Dr. Kent Scott officiating.

Mike and Lisa Leydig provided music which included "Gentle Hands" and "I'll Fly Away".

Orphan Train lesson heard by the Mid-Century Club

She said in the late 1800s there was much overcrowding in the big cities, and poor living conditions. Many children were living on the street. The Children's Aid Society and The New York Foundling Hospital developed the Orphan Trains. It is estimated that 200,000 orphaned,

abandoned and homeless children rode these trains into 47 states and Canada.

The first documented train in Kansas arrived in Manhattan in 1867, and it is estimated that between 5,000 and 6,000 children found homes in the state. Concordia is the home of the new National Orphan Train Complex and each June a two-day event is dedicated to celebrate the orphan train riders still able to attend.
