University of Kansas offering students scholarships

Students graduating from high school in Norton County may benefit from new \$5,000 University of Kansas scholarships. The scholarships are available to encourage students with financial hardships and other challenges to attend KU.

A \$5 million gift commitment to KU Endowment from the Ernst F. Lied Foundation created the scholarship program, known as the Christina M. Hixson Opportunity Awards. Christina Hixson is the trustee of the Lied Foundation of Las Vegas, Nev.

Candidates for the awards must be graduates of Kansas high schools who, due to life challenges or lack of resources, might not consider pursuing a college education. Recipients must demonstrate financial need and qualify academically for admittance to KU.

The program will offer the first 10 awards to freshmen admitted for the 2007-2008 academic year.

It will continue to add 10 more scholarships per year until the program supports renewable scholarships for 40 students.

KU Chancellor Robert Hemenway said the new program would be an important addition to the more than \$20 million in privately funded scholarship aid given to about 5,000 KU students each year.

“The Hixson Opportunity Awards will make available educational opportunities for students who might not otherwise believe it possible to pursue a college education,” Mr. Hemenway said.

The Christina M. Hixson Opportunity Award Fund will be managed by KU Endowment, the official fundraising and fundmanagement organization for the University of Kansas. Founded in 1891, KU Endowment is the first foundation of its kind at a U.S. public university.

Extension Council holding elections

Elections for the Norton County Extension Council will be held Nov. 6 through Nov. 10 at the county extension office on the first floor of the courthouse, which is open from 8 a.m. to noon and 1 to 5 p.m.

Those who wish to vote can also do so from 5 to 7 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 5, at the 4-H Building in Norton during the annual 4-H Achievement Night.

Any resident of Norton County 18 years of age or older is eligible to vote.

The extension council is an elected body of 24 representatives, who plan and evaluate the extension’s educational programs. It is made up of four program development committees — agriculture, family and consumer sciences, 4-H and youth and economic development.

At this election, 12 representatives, three from each committee, will be elected.

The council urges all residents 18 or older to exercise their right to vote.

City of Norton Snow Ordinances

The City of Norton wants to remind the public of our three snow ordinances. One requires the removal of snow and ice off public sidewalks within 24 hours after the fall of the snow or sleet. The second ordinance relates to removing parked vehicles from emergency snow routes. When the City of Norton publicly announces through the news media that an emergency snow condition exists, it is a violation to have any vehicle or snow trailer parked on a designated emergency snow route. The third ordinance makes it a violation for any person to pile or dump snow on any cleared street from a private driveway or sidewalk so as to constitute an impediment or hazard to normal traffic on the street. The city of Norton thanks everyone for their efforts in complying with these ordinances.
