According to the Daily Telegram, "The score was tied 7 to 7 and all depended on the last quarter. The air was tense with excitement and the boys played as they never played before. Both lines were strong and they were both playing to win. There were only a few more minutes to play, when Payton saved the day by a drop kick. As the ball went sailing between the goal posts, the anxious crowd broke into shouts of victory. Norton had won by a score of 10

Next came the second encounter with Oberlin on the Red Devils' home territory. A front page story in the Daily Telegram made it clear to the estimated 150 Norton fans planning to take the train that it would leave on time. "A false report is in circulation regarding the train service on the Burlington for Friday," the story began. "The train will not be held here until noon if it is on time when it arrives.

"The leaving time for the Burlington passenger is 10:20 a.m. and to be on the safe side be at the depot at that time. As a rule the train does not leave the coal chute until 10:30 but you, yourself must take chances on that part of the program. You have 10 minutes grace ordinarily but remember the leaving time of the Burlington on its published time card is 10:20

"Mr. Davidson, the agent, says no one has any authority to order a U.S. Mail train delayed.

Following the big game between Norton and Oberlin, the Daily Telegram printed a play-byplay account. "One half inch of rain at Oberlin last night and the grounds were very wet but the weather was fine and there was an enthusiastic crowd of about 600," said the paper.

Late in the first quarter, Oberlin punted the ball out-of-bounds on the Norton two yard line. Norton could not get out of the hole and punted back to the Red Devils.

They took over on the Norton 25 and drove on the ground for a first down on the Norton one yard line. The Blue Jay defense held for two downs but Oberlin scored. Oberlin added two extra points and won the game 8-0. That left one final game of the
