Tags, taxes are due this month

The deadline for the first half of property taxes of 2006 to be paid without a penalty is Wednesday, Dec. 20. Remember to bring or send the stubs from your tax statements to ensure proper credit to your account.

New this year is the ability to pay your taxes online with a credit card or regular checking account. That website is www.kansas.gov/propertytax. If you have questions, please call the treasurer's office at 877-5795.

The deadline to renew automobile, light trucks, motorcycles and motorized bike tags for persons or businesses whose last name begins with "U", "X", "Y" or "Z" is Friday, Dec. 29.

When renewing your vehicle tags, remember to include your current proof of insurance for all vehicles. The vehicle identification number, policy number and expiration date need to be verified.

The Norton County Treasurer's Office will be closed for the Christmas holiday on Monday, Dec. 25.

Drivers license renewals can be processed Tuesday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Please bring your social security card or something that has your social security number on it for verification. The drivers license renewal station will close at noon on Friday, Dec. 29 for year end business.

For the third year in a row, Michelle (Patterson) Armbrister has organized the Mittens for Kittens campaign to raise funds and gather food, medications and toys for homeless pets at Norton's animal shelter.

Mrs. Armbrister said she organizes the event every year to raise public awareness about the shelter. She said, "Animals need homes and until they find homes they need to be taken care of."

The public is encouraged to bring donated items to the Norton Animal Health Center which helps sponsor the event. The veterinary clinic will also hold any monetary donations for the shelter. Dr. Aaron White said, "We're glad to be able to sponsor 'Mittens for Kittens' to help care for Norton's homeless pets."

Mrs. Armbrister has added a drawing to the event to raise additional money. There will be a drawing for a remote controlled Escalade/AM-FM radio. Tickets are \$1 each or 6 for \$5.

There is also a contest for children to enter. They are asked to write about "What My Pet Would Say About Christmas If They Could Talk." The deadline to enter is Dec. 22. Mrs. Armbrister said every entry will receive a prize.

In other business the board:
