It's no 'secret' anymore.

It seems that each new day brings a new scam, and the latest one was found in the classified ad section of some of the state's newspapers and dealt with becoming a "Secret Shopper.".

Atty. Gen. Phill Kline told *The* Norton Telegram and every other news outlet in the state that his Consumer Protection Division has received numerous complaints about a shopping scam being run by a company out of Canada.

Attorney General Kline said the scam seems to begin innocently enough when Kansans responded
