

# lennings bus company ready to roll

The Jennings bus plant will unveil its first product, a luxury touring coach, at the beginning of January during an open house in the old school at Jennings and then during a motor coach expo in New

Larry Brennan, vice president and spokesperson for Bus and Coach International in Jennings, said the 2007 BCI Falcon 45 Motor Coach will be unveiled during the company's open house, from 2 to 5 p.m. on Saturday, Jan. 6, at the firm's plant and showroom in Jennings.

Mr. Brennan said everyone is invited to the open house to see the new bus, see what the company has done to the school and meet some of the employees.

BCI purchased the former Jennings School in August and has been remodeling the building since. One of the first things people might have noticed was a fence that went up around the property.

On the inside, construction workers dry wall, tiles, painting and more.

One thing the crew left, said Mr. Brennan, was the "Jennings Coyotes" name on the gym floor, which was care-

fully covered so it wouldn't be destroyed. This is a new start-up business in Kansas because these coaches were formed to market the new coach design in Jennings, Mr. Brennan said. BCI has related operations in Delaware and Nevada.

Mr. Brennan said the firm has doubled its payroll in the last month, and now has over 20 employees here. He said they have tried to hire as many as they can from the

One of the employees is Tom Peter of Selden, who said he has worked at BCI from "day 1," doing construction.

Mr. Peter, said Mr. Brennan, has many talents which are being used at the plant.

This company moving here has been the best thing for the community, said Mr. Peter. It has brought in money for many businesses all around the area.

Mr. Brennan said some of the employhave been busy putting in new restrooms, ees, including the executive team, moved to the area, but all of the latest hiring was

done here. Everyone will be able to meet the executives and other employees and talk with them at the open house, said Mr. Brennan.

In the early part of the next year, said Mr. Brennan, the company will be talking about growing again. BCI, he said, is a Kansas based American company that designs and builds American-style coaches for the North American market.

The buses, he said, are assembled in China with Australian steel, but the coach is designed for the North American market at 102 inches wide and 45 feet long.

The firm, said Mr. Brennan, wants serviceability, value and quality in each of the vehicles.

The coaches hold 56 passengers and boast a restroom. The idea is that the coaches are used for day trips or basically as a tour bus.

After they're assembled, they'll be shipped to the states by ship and brought to Jennings, where each bus will be inspected to make sure everything is ready
