# When storms approach stock up and eat well

With a wintry mix of snow and ice in the forecast, stocking the pantry with ready-to-eat foods and a manual can opener — can ensure nourishment in the event of a power outage or the inability to

Since often there is no telling how long it will be until power is restored or roads cleared, it's wise to eat perishable foods such as sandwich meat, cheese, salad greens, and leftovers first, so they won't be wasted or spoil.

The internal temperature of a refrigerator or freezer will rise each time the door is opened, however, so minimize the number of times doors are opened.

Having a well-stocked pantry with ready-to-eat shelf-stable foods that can satisfy hunger and help maintain energy levels is an asset, but particularly so when a storm prevents a trip to the store or interrupts traditional cooking methods. Examples of such foods include peanut butter, crackers, canned fruits and juices, vegetables (three-bean salad, for example), cooked canned lean meats, poultry and fish, cereal (eaten dry or with reconstituted dry or canned milk) and processed cheese products. Cooked food in pouches, such as fish, and dried fruit, cereal bars, and snack packs also provide nutrition. Consider having bottled water on hand as

Buy single-serve foods such as small cans of fruit that have pull tabs for easy opening. This reduces the chance of leftovers.

be sure to have extra on hand to keep them nourished. This tip also applies to individuals who require special diets such as nutritional supplement beverages. Check on supplies of medica-

tions, pet food and personal items. Having at least a three-day supply of food and other essentials is generally recommended. Beware of potential risks of carbon monoxide poisoning (linked in some cases to portable genera-

tors) and the risk of fire, which can

occur when using a charcoal grill inside the garage or home. The American Red Cross web site, www.redcross.org, has excellent information on how to prepare for a disaster. It also has information on water storage and other

disaster supplies to have on hand. If you have further questions relating to storm safety, contact your local K-State Research and Extension Office.


