

A large crowd watched 33 contestants participate in the 2007 Northern Valley Spelling Bee held Tuesday in the Long Island school.

Grades four, five, six, seven and eight had their classroom champions there to compete. At the end, two eighth graders, Matthew Dole and his twin sister, Staci Dole, battled it out in 12 rounds to decide the Northern Valley School champion.

Matthew was declared the winner when Staci misspelled "scissors". He correctly spelled that word plus the next word, "hundredth", to secure first place.

Seven students battled for the next places in the contest to advance to the county competition. Tyler Montgomery, seventh grade, edged out Ashley Constable and Sean Braun to be the third junior high representative to advance to the county level.

Meanwhile, Alex Stevens, fifth grade, Olivia Lowry, sixth grade, and Alex Tharman, sixth grade, nudged out Erika Chandler to advance to the 2007 Norton County Spelling Bee.
