• If odor remains, wipe the inside of the unit with equal parts vinegar (which provides acid that destroys mildew) and water. Consider allowing the appliance to air out for several days.

Other ideas include stuffing the refrigerator and freezer with crumpled newspapers, closing the door and allowing several days for the newspaper to absorb odors. the appliance with vinegar and
