

As the students entered the band room, they drew a number from 1 to 97, and were seated in the chair labeled with the corresponding number.

Miss Ross explained the rules and also pronounced the words.

In round 1, "bald" was the first word missed. "Cheek" was the first word missed in round 2 and "miner" was the first word to take out a speller in round 3. As the words became more difficult, more contestants were eliminated. "Dental" was the first misspelled word in round 4 and "preserve" was the first word missed in round 5.

## Airport needs to finish master plan

Tom Bennett of BG Consultants spoke to the Airport Board Monday evening and said bids for airport improvements need to be let soon.

But, before that can happen all the proposed improvements needed to be incorporated into the Master Plan and submitted for approval to the Federal Aviation Administration. That plan includes the layout of the airport, its runways, taxiways and hangars. It also includes the Bolt, the physical education teacher proposed improvements of a refueling proval.

He said Norton City/County Airport has the approval for almost \$194,000 in grant money and the Airport Board will have to match five percent of that amount.

When discussing the plans for a refueling station an automatic system was proposed to enable pilots to refuel themselves in the event an attendant was not available.

## Speaker gets great response from students

It's not too often a speaker gets a standing ovation from junior high and high school students. But, that's exactly what happened Monday morning after a presentation by Nicole Nowlen, a survivor of the Columbine shootings.

Miss Nowlen spoke to a combination of fifth through twelfth graders from both Norton and Northern Valley schools about a program called Rachel's Challenge that is being introduced into schools all across America.

Rachel's Challenge is named for Rachel Scott who was the first person killed at Columbine High School on April 20, 1999. Miss Nowlen shared video and audio footage of Rachel's life and the Columbine tragedy. She spoke
