Logan celebrates Labor Day

An estimated 1,800 people attended the morning and afternoon festivities, evening musical entertainment and gigantic fireworks display at the 31st annual Labor in Logan on Sunday.

"The beautiful weather made for an enjoyable day," said Shirley Hendrickson, director of the Dane G. Hansen Museum, sponsor of

One of the highlights was the afternoon performance of the Prairie Duster Drill Team. A local women's drill team on horseback formed in 1985, they attracted a large crowd of all ages who enjoyed their precision maneuvers and were allowed to pet the horses and talk to their riders following the performance.

Since the late John Wayne would have celebrated his 100th birthday this year, the Prairie Dusters' opening drill was a tribute to the American cowboy legend.

"The audience of all ages was thrilled by their presentation," said Hendrickson.

Presently, there are 15 active members of the Prairie Dusters, the official color guard for Kansas' Biggest Rodeo in Phillipsburg.

In addition to leading the Phillipsburg Rodeo parade and performing all three nights of the rodeo, they do a lot of traveling and performing. Besides appearances in communities all over Kansas, they have traveled five times to Cheyenne, Wyo., to perform during Frontier Days. Four times they returned with the Most Outstanding Riding Group Award from the "Daddy of Em All"

downtown parade. Three times the Prairie Dusters made the long trip to Ruidoso, NM, where they performed twice at the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium and once for the preshow prior to the running of the All-American Futurity, all of which took place at the famous Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

As the evening finale, Rainbow Fireworks from Inman presented another fantastic fireworks display which was enhanced by the playing of patriotic music.

As always, the Logan Fire Department, under the direction of longtime chief Lawrence "Sonny" Ruff, was on hand to make sure there were no grass fires caused by fireworks.

The Logan Emergency Medical Services were present as well.

The Logan Chamber of Commerce operated the main food booth but there were plenty of others available so that event goers had many choices.

Children had fun throughout the day going down the "Moonwalks 4 Fun" 22-foot slide from Hays. "Some 'old' kids were even seen on the slide," said Hendrickson.

Prairie Dog Creek WTAP Sign-up Period Starts September 1

The State Conservation Commission will begin accepting applications for the new water right retirement program, WTAP, beginning September 1.

WTAP is a voluntary, incentive-based program designed to help restore aguifers and streams in critical areas. The Prairie Dog Creek basin has been selected as a pilot project area because it is significant in the State of Kansas' efforts to maintain compliance in the Republican River Compact with the State of Nebraska

Applicants who are selected for WTAP grants are compensated by the State Conservation Commission in exchange for the permanent retirement of a water right. Priority is given to retiring water rights in areas which would have the greatest impact on the stream system. WTAP grants are approved on the basis of competitive bids and the fair market value of water rights.

To be eligible, water rights must have been actively used in the last 10 years. Dryland farming is permitted after a water right is retired. Limited irrigation can be temporarily allowed to establish a permanent cover on the land being transitioned from irrigation. Partial water right reductions can also be considered for retirement grants.

The first sign-up period will be September 1, 2007 through November 15, 2007.

A plan might look good on paper — but, until it's put to the test,

it's not known if it will work. The Norton County Health Department is required to have disaster plans in place geared to specific public health issues. One of these addresses setting up a "mass dispensing clinic," or a Point of Mass Dispensing. This clinic is designed to control the spread of a disease by dispensing medications (such as antibiotics or anti-virals) and/or administering vaccines to a large number of people. A secondary use of this clinic would be to help Norton County residents with food and water in the event of a natural disaster, like a tornado, according to the health department.

An evening of training for the clinic command staff and volunteers was held Aug. 29 at the Norton Junior High School. This was a "walk-through" of the clinic.
