Prison celebrates 20 years

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The Norton Correctional Facility is celebrating 20 years of hard work and dedication to the partnership that exists between the surrounding communities and the facility. The administration would like to invite the public to join the staff at a luncheon to be served from 11:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m., Thursday, Sept. 27. A short program is planned at 1 p.m.

For those wishing to see and experience more of the facility, and the work the inmates are involved in, tours of the facility will be offered following the program..

Norton Correctional Facility got its beginning in September of 1987 as 24 inmates and 13 employees set foot on the grounds of the minimum security compound. Promoting public safety, assisting victims of crime by exercising safe and effective containment and supervision of inmates and assisting offenders in becoming law-abiding citizens, became the mission of the facility.

In the beginning, the grounds were shared with the Norton State Hospital, however in the fall of 1988, the last of the mentally challenged clients left and more inmates and staff arrived as the correctional facility assumed full control of the facilities.

Since 1987, the medium/minimum security institution has been expanded to house 835 inmates and to include a physical site at Stockton.

Norton Correctional Facility's current workforce includes 268 state employees and 52 individuals who provide contracted services. The employees come from 30 communities in the two-state area of Kansas and Nebraska. The facility's rounded figures for total payroll of state employees injects approximately \$1,014,000 into the local economies each month for a total of approximately \$12,165,000/year.

Day-to-day operations have a significant impact on the greater northwest Kansas area. At the Central Unit located at Norton, NCF spends approximately \$49,500 per month in utilities and \$8,129 in automotive-related expenses. Additional monthly expenditures include \$4,522 for clothing items and \$13,564 for general supplies. The East Unit (Stockton) averages approximately \$8,069 for utilities, \$2,503 for automotive-related expenses. \$743 for clothing and \$2,053 for general supplies each month. Inmates housed at Norton Correctional Facility provide maintenance at area lakes and complete general clean up, construction, renovation, or demolition projects as requested by local governments or non-profit organizations. An average of 10,000 man-hours of community service per month in Norton, Stockton and surrounding communities has been a huge benefit for the citizens of the State. When these work hours are multiplied by the federal minimum wage, the result is an estimated cost benefit to area communities of \$52,000 per month.

An 82-year-old Norton man was taken to the hospital after wrecking a semi truck Tuesday.

Raymond D. Garrison was eastbound on K-9, a half a mile east of New Almelo, in a 1992 Peterbuilt when the truck veered across the road and went into a ditch. It then went over a county road, across a field drive and hit a large concrete culvert.

Mr. Garrison was taken by Norton County ambulance to the Norton County Hospital, where he was treated and later released.

He was not wearing his seat belt at the time of the accident.
