Out with the kennel, in with training

A Norton woman who wanted to build a kennel in town is going to Plan B.

Councilwoman Donna Foley said the Public Safety Committee received a request to allow a dog kennel to be built in town in the 1100 block of N. Norton. But, she said, the general public was against the kennel and so the committee is recommending against it.

She said about 25 people attended the committee meeting to express their concerns about barking dogs and odor. They also received letters and a survey from the residents of Prairie Meadows apartments,

five of whom were against the kennel.

Mrs. Foley said she also found out that a motion wasn't needed to discuss the matter and so she wouldn't be making a motion.

Roxane Kent, the woman who wanted to open the kennel, said people were thinking that she would be full all year long. In reality, she said, she would only be full during the holidays. The rest of the year, she said, she'd have maybe one or two dogs, or no dogs at all.

She said there wouldn't be barking because it generally wouldn't be full. Also, there would be no odor, because she has to clean it with Clorox every day, meet-

ing state codes and inspections.

"If I can keep 200 or 300 dogs quiet in the middle of Denver, I think I can keep 10 quiet," she said. "Also, this would be adding a service to the community that is desperately needed."

The area, she said, is zoned as light industrial.

Mrs. Foley said it is something that is needed, but maybe not in the city limits. She said she contacted economic development on Ms. Kent's behalf and they should be contacting her.

Ms. Kent said if she couldn't open the kennel, then she planned on opening a dog
