People participating as the patients went to the Norton Junior High School, where they went through reception and registration. It was at registration that the first check of allergic reactions was made. From there, people went either to the slow or fast dispensing lane. People were put in the fast lane when there were no "red flags", such as possible allergic reactions. They received their medications and then were allowed to leave. Those in the slow lane had a one-on-one consultation with either Dr. Glenda Maurer or Dr. Craig Krizek. After their their medication and were allowed

Ms. Frack said they intentionally set up some of the patients with problems to test the staff. People pretended to have allergic reactions and hysteria, while others just went off the deep end.
