## Wava V. Hickert March 1, 1921 - Oct. 20, 2007

Wava V. Hickert, 86, died at the Phelps Memorial Health Center in Holdrege, Neb. on Saturday.

She was born March 1, 1921, the daughter of The Rev. Earl and Beatrice (Russell) Jarboe at Marshalltown, Iowa. She had three siblings — Russell, Violet, and Kenneth.

In 1928 when she was ready to begin school, they lived in Burr Oak. In 1931, they moved to Springdale, Arkansas, and later back to Iowa to Grant and Elliott. When she was ready for high school, they lived at Hansell, Iowa, near Hampton where she started school again. She graduated with the class of 1939. In the fall, she attended Iowa State Teachers College in Cedar Falls, Iowa. After completing two years, she was given her kindergarten/primary teacher's certificate. Her first teaching position was at Tennant, Iowa.

On April 5, 1942, she and Howard R. Gamble of Persia, Iowa, were married. She was then a farmer's wife and they became parents of David, Rose Ann, and Paul. On April 2, 1950, her husband died in a fatal tractor accident after helping a neighbor.

Mrs. Hickert was a substitute teacher for a while and then took a kindergarten/primary position near Desota, Iowa, to be closer to her parents. At that time, she lived in Adel, Iowa.

On Dec. 23, 1952, she married Lester Ankenman of Dellvale. She was, again, a farmer's wife and mother. They had two children — Lee and Shirley. Almost 16 years later, he died in a tractor accident on Dec. 5, 1968. She had been attending Fort Hays State University at the time, working toward her degree so that she could help with the family finances. After his death, she continued at Fort Hays State University, living for a year in Hays with her two youngest children.

She received her Bachelor's of Science degree in education in 1970, after which the family returned to Norton where she taught second grade at Eisenhower Elementary School for 15 years. While teaching, she served as president of the area's reading association.

On Oct. 30, 1979, she and Norman Hickert married. They were married for 20 years before he died.

After retiring in 1980, Mrs. Hickert served on the Norton School Board for eight years. She was a member of the Association of University Women and continued her membership in the Delta Kappa Gamma teacher's society in her retirement years. The Business and Professional Women named her Woman of the Year. She served on the Norton County Museum Board and was active in her church's activities on the local, district, and regional levels.

Mrs. Hickert loved to sing, especially sacred songs. She directed the Norton County H.D.U. chorus in the 50s. She was music director at the Maple Grove Church of the Brethren as long as she was able. She served as camp director for the Western Plains Church Camp of her church for five years.

She also loved traveling. She took a number of tours, but her favorite one was in Europe. She loved nature and enjoyed watching birds. She had compassion for the American Indian and helped Indian children for many years.

She is survived by her children, David and Sherry Ankenman, Lincoln, Neb.; Rose Ann and Jim Miller, Norton; Paul and Jackie Ankenman, St. Cloud, Minn.; Lee and Marla Ankenman, Wheatridge, Colo.; and Shirley and Chet Darby, Topeka; two brothers, Russell Jarboe, Everett, Wash.; and Kenneth Jarboe, Westminster, Colo.; a sister, Violet Laudner, Dumont, Iowa; seven grandchildren; two step-grandchildren; and one great-granddaughter.

Funeral services will be held at 10:30 a.m. on Thursday at Enfield Funeral Home in Norton with burial following at Norton Cemetery.

Visitation will be held from 3 to 8:30 p.m. on Wednesday at the funeral home.
