Bakers get ready... the first ever Christmas Cookie Contest is just around the corner.

It is a fund raiser for God's Pantry in Norton and will be held at The Telegram office, 215 S. Kansas Ave.

Anyone can enter the contest with as many different types of cookies they want. The cookies just need to be homemade. Each entry will cost \$5 and will need to be at The Telegram by 10 a.m. on Dec. 5. Each entry also needs to have at least two dozen cookies, so that there are plenty for the judging.

# Radiology weighs pros, cons of going digital

The radiology department at the Norton County Hospital is looking at getting new equipment.

Mitch Bartels, supervisor of the radiology department, told the hospital board last week that his department is considering new equipment, which will enhance radiology.

The equipment, he said, is a digital radiology system and a digital archive. The new system would make it so that the hospital no longer had to use films for X-rays, with the exception of mam-

He said it will also allow the hospital's doctors to have almost immediate access to the X-rays. The specialist doctors would also be able to log in to the system to see the X-rays.

Mr. Bartels said the images in the digital archives would be kept for five to seven years. There would be a back-up system in Utah and a separate back up of that system as well.

He said the Hays Medical Center received a grant and is sharing it with seven northwest Kansas hospitals. The Norton County Hospital can spend up
