The daughter of John A. and Margaret "Maggie" (Zwiers) DeYoung, she was born Nov. 30, 1919, in Prairie View. She spent her life in service to others as a teacher and missionary.

School, Central College in McPherson and Asbury College in Wilmore, Ky., Miss. DeYoung taught for six years in public schools in Kansas, before leaving the United States to serve as a missionary to South America.

In 1946, she traveled to Coshe began worship services and a school in Barbosa.

Because of threats on her life, she moved from there and spent two years in Medellin teaching missionary children. Because of mounting persecution in Columbia, the Oriental Missionary Society asked her to go to Ecuador for a year and organize children's meetings.

That "one year in Ecuador" extended to 33 years of service. Miss DeYoung began her child evangelism work in January, 1953. Through the years, the neighborhood children's classes she started developed into new churches. She pioneered workshops in child evangelism and Christian education in OMS Ecuadorian churches where she trained national leaders in ministry. Women and children across Ecuador heard the story of Jesus through her faithful work.

When Miss De Young retired in 1986, she continued to share her heart for Hispanic people through leadership and encouragement to the Hispanic congregation at First United Methodist Church in Kissimmee, Fla., and later moved to Greenwood, Ind. 46142

Geneva De Young, 88, died yes- the Good Samaritan Retirement Village in Orlando, Fla. In 2004, she returned to Kansas to the Andbe Home.

Miss DeYoung was preceded in death by her parents, John and Margaret De Young; her brother, John A. De Young, Jr.; her sisters, A graduate of Almena High Mildred De Young Smith and Rosalie De Young Shepherd; and one nephew, David Eller Smith.

Survivors include: one sister, Imogene De Young of Mukileto, Wash.; and as a tribute to her lifelong love of children, she is survived by children everywhere.
