# Second half rally lifts Blue Jays over Hill City

After falling behind in the second quarter, the Norton Community High School boys varsity basketball team rallied in the second half to defeat Hill City 70-58 in Mid-Continent League play Friday night in Hill City.

The Blue Jays got a solid start in the first quarter with senior forwards Wes Georgeson and Preston Herman leading the way. Herman hit three baskets and Georgeson hit two baskets and a free throw as Norton took a 14-9 lead.

The Ringnecks outscored the Blue Jays 23-16, however, in the second quarter to take a 32-30 lead at half-time. Hill City hit eight baskets in the period and four of them were from beyond the arc.

Georgeson hit three more baskets for Norton, senior point guard Logan Kats, who concentrated on long range shots in the game, hit his first of four treys along with two free throws, sophomore guard Landon Hamel buried a three-pointer and Herman tallied on another basket.

The second half belonged to the Blue Jays as they outscored the Ringnecks 16-7 in the third period to take a 46-39 lead and had a 24-19 scoring advantage in the final stanza.

Georgeson kept the nets smoking in the second half just as he had in the first as he threw in three more baskets in the third period and three more in the fourth. Kats added two more baskets from beyond the arc in the third quarter and another trey and 4 of 4 from the charity stripe in the final stanza

Senior guard Jared Cox, who had hit just one basket in the first three quarters, ended with a bang as he buried a three-point shot, hit another two-point basket and two free throws for 7 of his 9 points. He was 3 of 6 overall from the field for 50 percent shooting and hit 2 of 3 charities for 67 percent.

The Blue Jays missed just three free throws in the game as they swished 16 of 19 for 84 percent accuracy.

Hill City also shot well from the line but didn't have as many attempts. They were 7 of 9 on charities for 78 percent.
