Our snowfalls top 34 inches

ell, the last time we talked about the amount of snowfall we've had this season (Jan. 18 issue of The Telegram) it totaled 24 1/4 inches. Since then we've added several more inches, thanks, in large part, to the 9 inches that fell in the snowstorm of Feb. 5. Anyhow, to make a long story short before it melts, Norton County has received 34 3/4 inches of the white stuff dating back

to November of 2007. Our weather records and precipitation amounts are recorded by Karolyn Kingham on her farm nine miles northwest of Norton.

I put in a call to the National Weather Service at Goodland on Tuesday to see how our snowfall translates into moisture content. They did caution that not all snowfalls are the same, some are heavier with more precipitation, others are light with less moisture. Well, generally speaking, our total snowfall so far this season didn't produce as much moisture as I thought. The good people over at Goodland said it takes 13 inches to equal one inch of moisture. Taking our figure of 34 3/4 inches (they actually figured it on 34 inches), they came up with 2.6 inches. Hey, that's better than nothing, which in some recent winters was the figure — nothing.
