Blue Jay boys, girls score wins over Hoxie

Low scoring game goes to boys 42-32

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com Neither team shot very well but the Norton Community High School varsity boys basketball team took more shots and controlled the boards to defeat Hoxie 42-32 on Tuesday evening in the NCHS Stull Gymnasium in Norton.

Norton held an 11-7 lead after one quarter and a 12-10 second quarter in favor of the Blue Jays made it 23-17 at half-time. The low scoring third quarter ended with Norton scoring 9 points and Hoxie 6 and the Blue Jays extending their lead to 32-23.

The Blue Jays outscored the Indians 10-9 in the fourth quarter to extend the final margin of victory to 10 points.

Point guard Logan Kats was Norton's only double figure scorer. He did most of the damage to the Indians in the first half when he buried three baskets from beyond the arc en route to a 15 point game. He hit 3 of 7 from long range for 43 percent accuracy, 1 of 4 twopoint tries for 25 percent and 4 of 11 overall for 36 percent. Kats Zac Dreher, 1. swished 4 of 7 from the charity stripe for 57 percent.

Forward Preston Herman tallied 9 points on 4 of 13 from the

field for 31 percent and 1 of 2 free the Indians had 11. Kats led with 6, throws for 50 percent. Forward followed by Cox, 4; Gall, 2. Wes Georgeson added 8 points on 4 of 5 from the field for a net smoking 80 percent.

Leading scorer for Hoxie was Matt Weis with 10 points.

"This was a good win for us but I didn't feel like we played with a lot of intensity throughout the game," said Norton head boys coach Doug Reusink.

As a team, the Blue Jays hit 5 of 17 from long range for 29 percent, 10 of 26 two-point attempts for 38 percent and 15 of 43 overall for 35 percent.

The Indians connected on 2 of 10 from beyond the arc for 20 percent, 12 of 29 two-point tries for 41 percent and 14 of 39 overall for 36 percent.

From the free throw line, Norton swished 7 of 11 for 64 percent p.m. compared to 2 of 5 for Hoxie for 40 percent.

The Blue Jays pulled 8 offensive and 18 defensive rebounds off the glass for 26 total while limiting the Indians to 5 offensive and 14 defensive boards for 19 total.

Herman was a "horse" on the boards as he pulled down 10 rebounds, followed by Jared Cox, 4; Landon Hamel, Kats, Wes Dreher 100-02; Preston Herman Georgeson, 3 each; J.D. Gall, 2; 401-29; Total 1057-1142.

Herman had 3 of Norton's 6 steals. Georgeson had 2 thefts and 3 1 0-1 9; Jon Peltz 3 0 0-0 6; Dreher had 1.

The Blue Jays had 12 assists and 2-5 32.
