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The No.3 seeded Norton Community High School girls basketball team got the Class 3A Substate Tournament off to an impressive start with a 63-35 victory over No.6 seeded Belleville on Tuesday evening in Norton's NCHS Stull Gymnasium.

With the win, Norton extended their season record to 14-7 and Belleville's season ended with a 10-11 mark.

In the other first round games on Tuesday, No.4 Beloit defeated No.5 Phillipsburg 59-53 and No. 2 Thomas More Prep-Marian of Hays outscored No.7 Ellsworth 78-23.

No.1 seed Sacred Heart of Salina received a bye.

In substate semi-final games this evening, Sacred Heart (15-5) will play Beloit (14-7) at 6 p.m. and Norton (14-7) will play Thomas More Prep-Marian (14-6) at 7:30

Winners will play at 6 p.m. Saturday for the championship and a berth next week in the Class 3A State Tournament in Hutchinson.

Junior post Hayli Bozarth was unstoppable around the basket and her teammates on the perimeter were efficient at getting the ball to her. The result was 25 points for Bozarth. She hit three baskets and three free throws in the first quarter when Norton scored 12 points and held the visitors to just 5 on two field goals.



Blue Jays 'earn' win

nortontelegram@nwkansas.com The No.3 seeded Norton Community High School boys basketball team was favored to defeat No.6 seed Phillipsburg in the first round of the Class 3A Substate Tournament in Norton on Monday evening, but nobody told the Panthers and they made the Blue Jays earn their 57-52 victory.

The win extended Norton's record to 15-6 and advanced the Blue Jays into Thursday night's semi-finals versus No.2 seed Sacred Heart of Salina (17-4).

In other first round games, No.1 seed Belleville (20-1) outscored No.8 Ellsworth 72-33 and No.4 seed Thomas More Prep of Hays (12-8) defeated No.5 Beloit 57-

Belleville played Thomas More Prep in the other semi-final contest on Thursday. Results of the two semi-finals games were not available at press time.

Norton's win over Phillipsburg ended the Panthers' season with a 10-10 record.

In a close first quarter, Norton took a slim 12-11 lead. The Blue Jays got three point baskets from senior point guard Logan Kats and sophomore guard J.D. Gall, a two-point basket by Kats and a two point basket and two free throws from senior forward Wes Georgeson.

Most of the Panthers' first quarter tallies came on two three point baskets and a free throw by their high scoring guard Dylan Frantz.
